

Crochet Fox Motif - Detailed Pattern (English)

This PDF contains a detailed, step-by-step crochet pattern for the delicate Fox Motif shown in the photos and diagrams. The pattern is written in English with standard crochet abbreviations. Suitable for advanced-beginner to intermediate crocheters. Please read all notes before starting.

Materials

- Yarn: Lightweight / 2 or fingering cotton yarn (the sample uses white cotton). - Hook: 2.0 mm – 3.0 mm depending on your yarn and tension (sample likely 2.5 mm). - Small amount of black yarn or embroidery thread for the nose/dot. - Tapestry needle for weaving ends and sewing. - Scissors, stitch markers (optional), blocking tools (pins, board, spray starch).

Abbreviations (US terms)

- ch — chain - sl st — slip stitch - sc — single crochet - hdc — half double crochet - dc — double crochet - tr — treble (triple) crochet - st(s) — stitch(es) - sk — skip - rep — repeat - RS — right side

Notes

- The motif is worked in rounds/rows as shown in the diagram. Each fox head is made individually and joined if making a garland or scarf. - Work loosely if you want a lacy look. Block the motif gently after finishing to open up stitches. - The diagrams included show stitch placement. Follow the chart for visual guidance.

Pattern — Fox Motif (Step-by-step)

Below is a detailed written version of the fox motif. This pattern interprets the stitch diagram; slight adjustments may be needed to match the exact sample size depending on yarn and hook. Work in the round unless otherwise indicated.

Round 0 — Center/start: Make a magic ring OR ch 4 and join with sl st to form a ring. (Magic ring recommended for a tidy center.)

Round 1: Ch 3 (counts as first dc). Work 11 dc into the ring. Join with sl st to top of ch-3. — Total: 12 dc.

Round 2 — Increase dome: Ch 3 (counts as dc), dc in same st, *2 dc in next st, 1 dc in following st* — repeat around to expand dome. Join.

Round 3 — Lacy shaping: Work sets of dc separated by ch-1 or ch-2 spaces to form the open lace of the fox forehead. Example: *dc in next 2 sts, ch 2, skip 1 st* rep around, adjusting to match diagram spacing.

Round 4 — Form lower face rail: Create a row of chains and dc to form the lower curve where the nose will attach: follow the diagram's chain foundation across base stitches.

Nose (triangular cone): Attach yarn at the base center of the face. Work rows: Row 1: ch 3, 3 dc across (or tr for longer cone). Row 2: turn, ch3, dec across (work fewer stitches) — continue decreasing rows until a point forms. Fasten off and weave in ends. Alternatively, you can work the nose as a small triangular motif of 4–6 rows of dc/tr and sew it on.

Ears (make 2): Work a small triangular ear: ch 6, Row 1: sc in 2nd ch from hook and across to shape a small triangle by increasing/decreasing (or follow diagram ear shape). Block and sew to the top of the head. The diagram shows ears worked as curved chain arches with dc clusters along the edge.

Open eye/cheek holes: Make the decorative open shapes by creating chain arches and skipping stitches: e.g., ch 6, skip 4 sts, sl st to next st — repeat on both sides to create symmetrical openings.

Join motifs: To make a garland or scarf, join motifs by single crochet or slip stitch at the small points indicated in the photo (usually at the tip of the nose or inner edges). The sample uses small slip-stitched joins so motifs hang flat.

Finishing touches: Add a small black nose by embroidering a French knot or attaching a tiny crocheted bead. Block each motif to finish the shape neatly.

Crochet Diagram / Chart

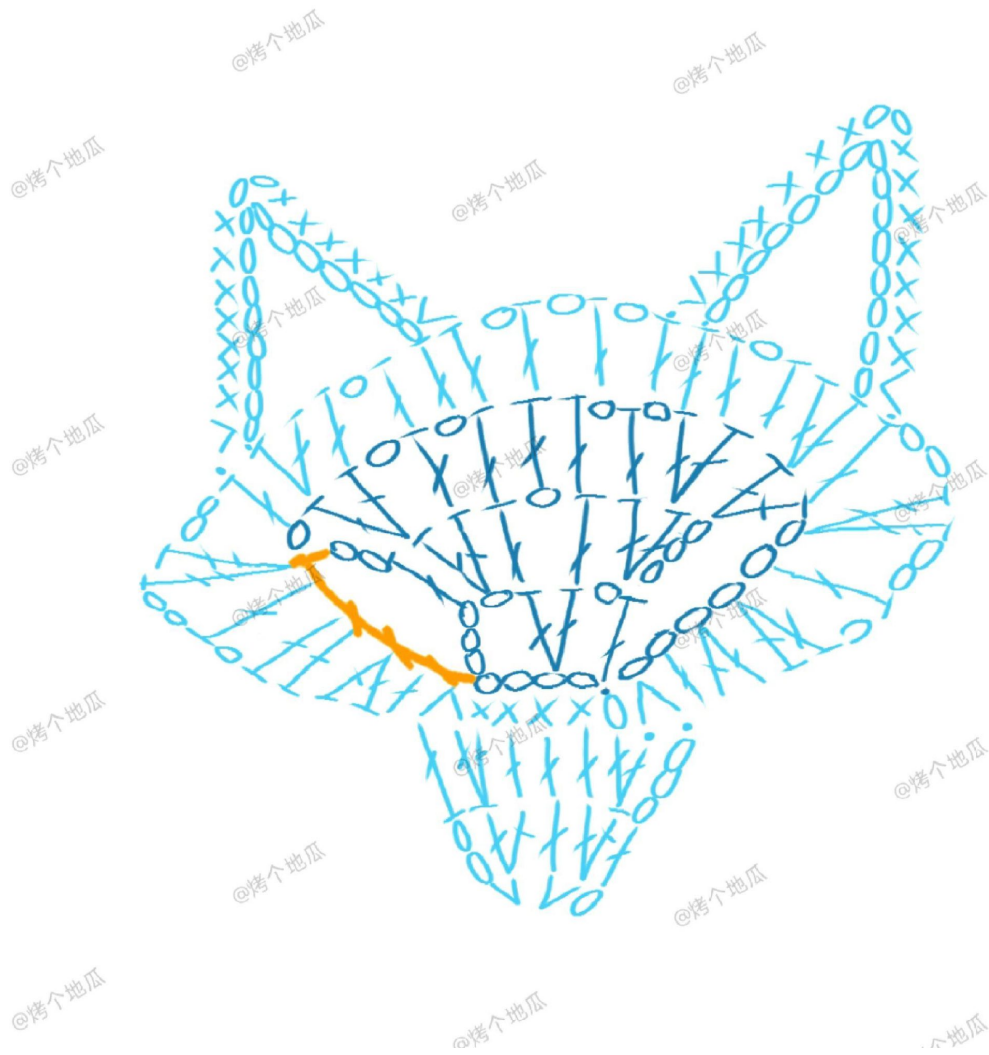
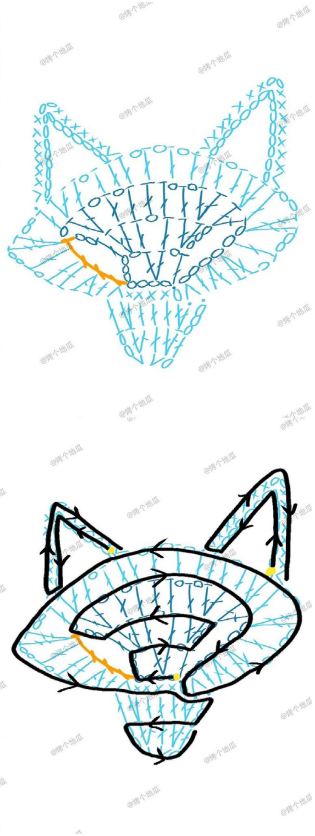


Diagram explanation: - Ovals = chain (ch). - Small crosses or 'x' = single crochet (sc). - Short vertical lines = double crochet (dc). - Longer vertical lines with extra bars = treble (tr) or double-triple stitches. - Follow symbols from center outwards, and pay attention to arrows showing direction.

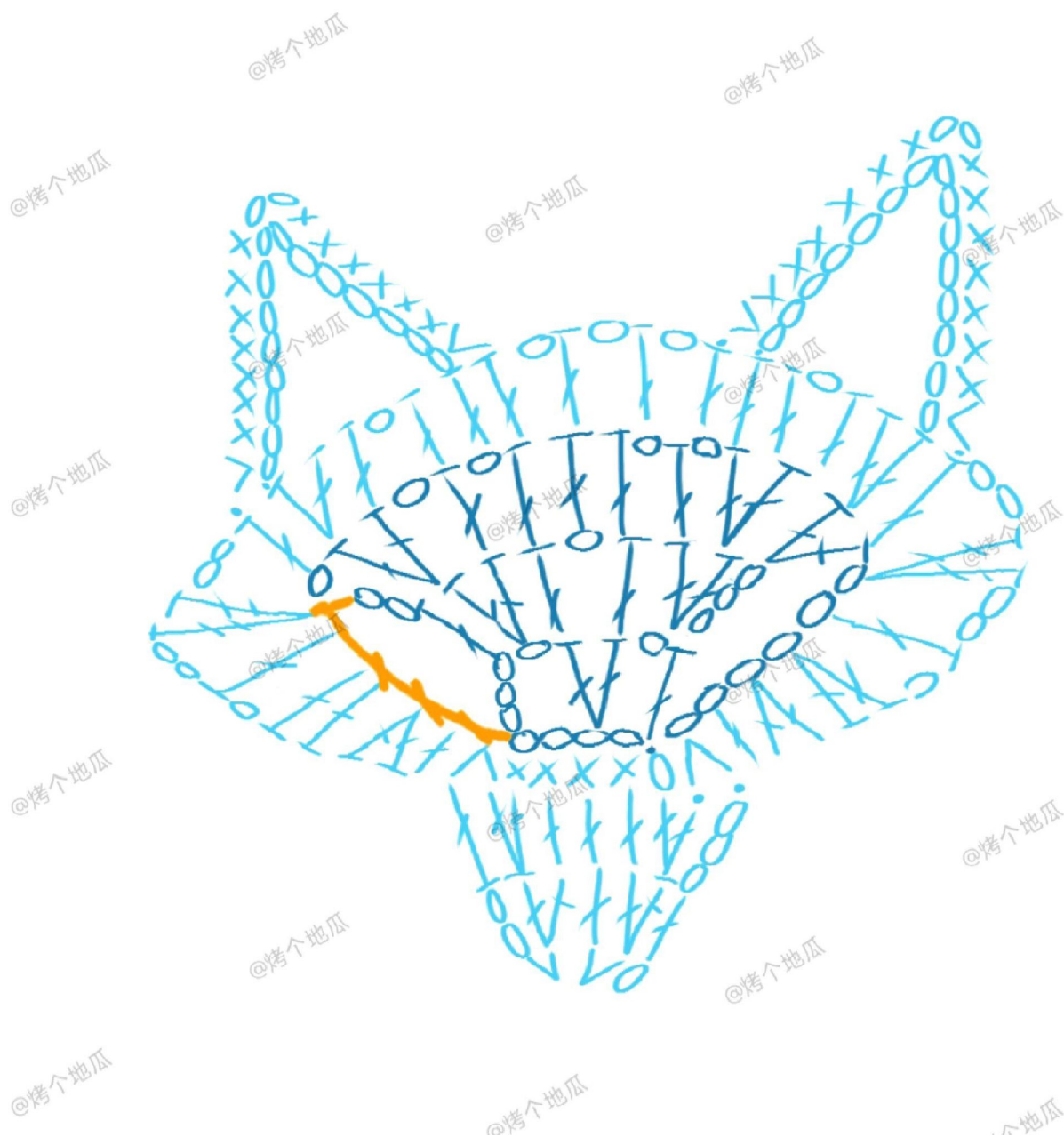
Assembly and Variation Ideas

- Make a garland: join nose to nose in a chain, or join at ear tips with small slip stitches. - Use colored yarn for ears or cheeks for a playful effect. - Turn into appliqués: sew onto bags, blankets, or garments. - Make a small black French knot or tiny crochet bead for the nose center (sample uses black dot).



Quick Reference (concise)

- Start: Magic ring; 12 dc in ring. Join. - Increase round: dc clusters with increases to form dome. - Create chain-spaces for eye/cheek openings. - Work triangular nose separately, attach. - Make two ears separately and attach. - Add black nose with embroidery or tiny crochet bead. - Block and finish.



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
